Hints & Answers* SHABBOS SHAILA: Sefer Shemiras Shabbos Kehilchosa (28:92) writes: "It is permitted to learn on Shabbos even those [Torah] topics that one needs to know for after Shabbos (e.g., for a test that will take place after Shabbos). And one does not violate through this the prohibition of preparing on Shabbos for a weekday." (see footnotes 220 and 221 ibid. for the reason, and also a discussion about learning secular topics for a test on Shabbos.) RHYME: "above" RIDDLE: The four directions of the world. Each one is mentioned in Lech Lecha (13:14). In the Tanach, we find that the north has one name - Tzafon, while the other three directions have two names: west: ma'arav & yam; east: mizrach & kedem; south: darom & negev. || Note: Menucha's answer are not to be taken as final decisions in halacha, but rather as a springboard for discussions, further study.

Parsha Pearls

When is the first time in Rashi's commentary on the Torah do we see a description of a Torah abiding Jew? In this week's parsha. Based on the Midrash, Rashi writes:

"אֲשֶׁר־עָשׂוּ בְחָרָן" - שהכניסן תחת כנפי השכינה, אברהם מגייר את האנשים, ושרה מגיירת הנשים, (פירוש רש"י בראשית יב:ה)

"and the souls they had acquired in Haran" - whom he had brought under the wings of the Shechinah. Abraham would convert the men, and Sarah would convert the women (Rashi's commentary to Bereishis 12:5)

Rashi describes the converts that Avraham and Sarah converted in Charan as "those whom they brought under the wings of the Shechina (Divine Presence).

What message is Rashi/Midrash trying to convey to us by describing the converts in such a way?

The message is that a Torah abiding Jew is someone who is under the wings of the *Shechina*.

Remember this when you wake up each morning. As you open your eye and say Mode Ani, think to yourself for a moment, "I am a Jew and I keep the Torah! That means that I am always under the wings of the *Shechina*!"

Haftorah Insights

In this week's Haftorah portion we read a powerful line from Yishayahu's prophecy (40:31):

וְקוֹיֵ ה' יַחֲלִיפוּ כֹחַ יַעֲלוּ אֵבֶר כַּנְשָׁרִים יָרוּצוּ וְלֹא יִיגָעוּ וֵלְכוּ וְלֹא יִיעָפוּ.

But those who put their hope in Hashem shall renew [their] strength, they will grow wings like eagles; they shall run and not weary, they shall walk and not tire.

The classic *peirush* Metzudas David writes the following explanation on the first part of this verse: "Those who put their hope in Hashem, renew their strength at <u>all times</u>." Hence from this verse, we learn an important fundamental life lesson: When you don't give up hope and look forward to Hashem's help, you always get new strength from Above that enables you to keep going forward!
